Liverpool a été démunie de son statut convoité de patrimoine mondial après que l'UNESCO ait accusé les années de développement d'avoir créé une perte irréversible de la valeur historique de ses quais Victoriens.

Les membres des Nations Unies au patrimoine ont conclu pendant une réunion en Chine mercredi que la "valeur universelle remarquable" des quais de Liverpool a été entachée par des nouveaux bâtiments, y compris le nouveau stade coûtant 500 millions de livres sterling du club de football Everton. La décision est comme une humiliation pour la ville, et accorde à Liverpool l'innombrable distinction d'être seulement le troisième lieu à perdre ce statut en presque cinquante ans.

Liverpool a profité du statut de patrimoine mondial de l'UNESCO depuis 2004 - le plus tard à côté du Taj Mahal et de la Grande Muraille de Chine - comme reconnaissance pour son rôle de grande puissance d'échange durant l'Empire Britannique et la beauté architecturale de ses quais. La menace de se voir retirer le titre a plané au-dessus de Liverpool alors que l'UNESCO a prévenu que le développement avait modifié le paysage urbain de façon significative et détruisait la valeur de l'héritage de ses quais.

Le comité des Nations Unies a dit du développement qu'il avait mené à une "sérieuse détérioration et une perte irréversible" à la remarquable valeur universelle de la région ainsi qu'une "perte significative de son authenticité et de son intégrité." Il a dit que

Is it legitimate to have British and American students pay for their higher education?

During the pandemic, students were on lockdown and couldn't go to school, and they found it unfair to pay tens of thousands of dollars a year to study without being allowed to go to school.

To begin with, higher education has to be paid by students in the United States and in the United Kingdom. One could understand how governments cannot fund everything. Moreover, charging the students for their tuition might even be productive as it could motivate them to work harder not to have to pay for another year if ~~they failed their exams~~ ever

However, higher education is overly expensive, and most students cannot afford to go to their dream college, no matter how hard they work for it. Only a few scholarships are granted, mostly to sportsmen, and students have to pay their debt back for years. As an example, former American president Barack Obama once said that when he had been elected, years after graduating college, he still hadn't paid his entire debt back. Only wealthy students can afford such colleges as the ones from the Ivy League, and recruiters would rather employ someone who went to Brown University or Oxford University than someone who went to some community college.

Thus, while I don't think governments could pay for everyone's tuition, less wealthy students should be helped in order to have the same chances as the others, and not to have to work twice as hard to get just as much when it comes to jobs or incomes.
