1. Should Charles III modernise the British monarchy?

"Not my king!" is the way King Charles was welcomed by a part of the British population when he became the new monarch. Queen Elizabeth II was the symbol of the British softpower, and her death could have been the end of this powerful monarchy. Does the British monarchy need to be modernised by King Charles III?

Although, at first glance, the British monarchy seems to have reached a breaking point, hiding many downsides, the country may still need it, modernised.

On the one hand, many people want the monarchy to be abolished. A group of republican people, named "Republic", agree with that. During the recent lockdown for example, the Royals seem to be useless for the population, and even harmful for the British economy, due to their cost. Furthermore, this system, far from ~~meritocratic~~ meritocracy, could encourage inequalities in the country. For example, it is impossible to imagine a monarchy of the Obama's family. So, why is it ~~allow~~ still accepted in the British population? However, some countries of the Commonwealth want to ~~end~~ leave it, like Jamaica. In On November of 2021, Barbados left it. There are several downsides hiding behind the Royals and their impact.

On the other hand, there are a lot of advantages, for the British softpower for example. The monarchy is a ~~symbol~~ symbol of power, all around

the world! This softpower attracts a lot of tourists, ~~which brings~~ who participate into the size of the British GDP. Moreover, in terms of inequalities, there is the example of the Scandinavian's monarchies, without a lot of inequalities! Furthermore, in a world constantly changing, with the Ukraine's war, with the 3 different Prime Ministers in only few months, the British population, and old people, need this stability.
