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Version

Même si Devangi Patel, 33 ans, travaille comme anesthésiste dans un grand centre médical près d'Atlanta depuis seulement deux ans, son but est de pouvoir se permettre de quitter son travail à 50 ans.

Dr Patel n'est pas la seule à avoir pour objectif de devenir indépendante financièrement, et à un âge plutôt bas. On dirait qu'un glissement générationnel est bien lancé : beaucoup d'actifs de la génération Y ne rêvent pas de partir à la retraite pendant ou à la fin de leur soixantaine, comme leurs parents. Beaucoup d'entre eux, qui ont une carrière professionnelle, cherchent plutôt à quitter leur travail avant leurs 50 ans, et travailler en tant qu'indépendants ou avoir un poste moins bien payé mais plus en accord avec leurs intérêts.

Mais alors que beaucoup d'actifs de la génération Y veulent l'indépendance financière pour leurs 50 ans, ce n'est pas facile à atteindre, cela va sûrement leur demander de mettre de côté entre 50% et 60% de leur salaire. La génération Y, qui est née entre 1981 et 1996, est entrée dans la vie professionnelle pendant la Grande Crise

et évolue dans un monde où les voies traditionnelles ~~pour~~ menant à la richesse, comme être propriétaire, sont hors d'atteinte pour une plus grande part d'entre elle que pour la génération précédente.

Leurs comportements sont aussi imprégnés d'une part d'incertitude. ils connaissent des changements économiques majeurs alors qu'ils sont sur le point de s'imposer.

## Essai

The monarchy is a real symbol of the UK. However many kings, princes and sovereigns have been overthrown in Europe over the past centuries and the English one is one of the last one standing. One may then wonder whether Charles III should modernise the monarchy.

The UK without the Royals isn't the UK. They are a symbol of it and even more to its citizens. The Queen's death has only proven it: hundreds of people were ready to wait hours outside just to see her casket. She was known for being really close to the English people. In return, they worshiped her: her face was used on millions of cups, tea towels or keychains sold as souvenirs. The British want and need their monarchy.

Nonetheless some of its rules or principles may seem outdated in our day and age. The Civil List for example is quite a hot-button issue. It is a list on which names of the royal family members or relatives are written. People, whose name is on this list, are taken care of and provided with goods, accommodation, clothing, ..., all luxury obviously. Therefore some people might be reluctant to paying taxes in order to fill in the wealthy needs of the Royals.

Moreover, the British monarchy carries quite an old-fashioned image on many subjects like education, gender gap, ... Even though Elizabeth II

was a powerful and respected female example, the royal family is the embodiment of "old-school" rules. For example, the whole process of accepting Meghan in the family, which by the way failed, showed how she struggled to fit in and how the Royals wouldn't accept her nor Harry if she didn't. Hence the British monarchy needs to be modernised for its younger generation.

Charles III might not be the perfect match to modernise the monarchy because of his age. Yet it still wants modernising and for example a simple rule as the length of a skirt for a woman could be abolished. Modernising the monarchy is about baby steps.
